

THE KOREAN WAR

(This is the ninth of a twelve part set of short comments on Wars fought beginning with the American Revolution through the Iraq War)

As World War II drew to a close, Korea had been under Japanese control for 40 years. The United States and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, ostensibly still allies, agreed to divide it at the 38th parallel; a Communist government was soon in place in the north and a corrupt but anti-communist government in the south. The USSR and China suggested to North Korea that U.S. military intervention resulting from an invasion was unlikely, and in 1950 the North invaded, quickly overrunning Seoul and much of the South. The newly formed United Nations Security Council condemned the action, and troops from the United States and 16 other nations were dispatched to the area. As UN troops under General MacArthur approached the Chinese border late in the year, the Chinese entered the fray with limited Soviet air involvement. Armistice talks

broke down in August 1951, and during the war's final two years both sides became entrenched near their original borders.
